Greetings members,

2020 certainly hasn't turned out as we planned! I was so looking forward to our seminars to learn from our outstanding senseis and to renew friendships over great food in the beautiful mountains of Highlands. Unfortunately, COVID-19 has disrupted our plans. To add to the bad news, we mourn the passing of Grand Master Betty Taylor. Her memorial service has been delayed due to the continued spread of the virus. Jane Newman shared information about a memorial fund which her Ikebana International chapter has developed and can be found in this newsletter. As members of NAOTA are aware, the annual conferences scheduled for San Diego this year and for Portland in 2021 have been cancelled.



The good news is we are proceeding with our plans for the Southeastern chapter seminars in 20201. Much of the planning

work for the 2020 seminars can be easily transferred to 2021. The June seminar will honor Betty Taylor by incorporating arrangements, containers and materials she loved As I write this letter, I am waiting to hear from Ohara School Headquarters regarding our request for a sensei.

The Board of Directors has been conducting chapter business virtually. Julia Van Huss (Vice President) and Marjorie DaVanzo (Secretary) have jumped right in to help us navigate these uncharted waters. Thank you to our outgoing officers Jennie Johnson and Susan Thomas for their outstanding contributions.

The proposed constitution/bylaws change to our fiscal year, was unanimously approved so future Treasurer's reports will reflect our new fiscal year of Jan-Dec. Twenty-seven votes were received

Nineteen members returned the survey. I've summarized the results for you.

- **** There is very strong interest in adding a 4th day of lessons to the June 2021 seminar and potentially to other seminars. The board will explore this idea for feasibility
- **** Members like having 2 seminars annually and predictability in knowing when the seminars will occur but having advanced notice of any changes is more important than a set week.
- **** There is some interest in holding seminars in other cities but minimal interest in chairing one. Having members residing in a city where a seminar is held is important for planning a seminar. Logistics are of particular importance since we store all our equipment in Highlands
- **** There is interest in an online presentation via Zoom or similar platform

Ohara School Headquarters has had their usual business interrupted by the pandemic. Overseas mailings were suspended earlier this year so issues of SOKA have not been sent. Certificates are being awarded but have not been sent. The new learning materials we were expecting are delayed and the online catalog for ordering is not available to us. 2020 began with the start of the revised curriculum. A further refinement regarding Free Expression has been issued which I will be emailing to you shortly..

I've adapted my teaching to incorporate masks and distancing. My students and I have found arranging has been a bright spot of normality when most other activities have been shut down. I'm fortunate that my garden and those of some friends has been a steady source of materials. I hope that you will find ikebana a continuing source of happiness and personal growth.




In Memory of Betty Jane Fuller Taylor

April 24th, 1924 - May 7th, 2020 Grand Master Ohara School of Ikebana

Betty dedicated her life to her students of The Ohara School of Ikebana. She taught lessons every week for over fifty years and her students are all levels up to first degree master. Many of her students are teaching, demonstrating and exhibiting. She was such a gifted teacher and left us with an enduring legacy. She conveyed the love and spirit of nature which is such a part of the Ohara School ideology. Through her we came to love Ohara Ikebana and appreciate the joy it brings.

Her life of sharing her love of Ohara Ikebana are accomplishments of so many teaching seminars, daily teaching at the Stone Lantern in Highlands, North Carolina for eight seasons. Six study tours to Japan which included participating in master lesson seminars and many, many demonstrations and exhibitions including exhibiting in Japan. Serving as President and other board positions for Ohara Chapters and Washington, D. C. Chapter One Ikebana International plus serving on numerous committees.

When Betty attended her first Ikebana International World Convention in Japan with the late Mrs. Ellen Gordon Allen her obsession with all things ikebana began. Upon her return home after this trip she immediately started her studies of Ohara Ikebana in New York City with the late Grand Master Mutsuo Tomita, traveling to the City by train. She also studied with the late Headmaster Houn Ohara during several of her trips to master lessons in Japan. Both of these great teachers encouraged her to take the path of teaching.

When the Stone Lantern discontinued Ohara Ikebana lessons at the end of the season in 2000, Betty continued to come to her Highlands cottage each season, arriving mid May and would teach at her home each week. She and the late Mr. Ralph deVille created the beautiful flower arrangements the store was so well known for until Mr. deVille's passing in 2015.

Betty taught many workshops for Ohara Chapters and her home Ohara School of Japanese Flower Arrangement Washington D. C. Area Chapter in Virginia. taught twenty-four seminars for the Southeastern U. S. Ohara Chapter and was instrumental in the revival of this Chapter. She also introduced us to other great teachers for our Chapter's seminars: Grand Master Mutsuo Tomita, Grand Master Reiko Kawamura and First Degree Master José Salcedo.

With Betty's unique talent she was able to create magic with only a few flowers, branches or leaves.

"The Chinese Celadon Jug has a history with memories.

"In my hands it has traveled to many demonstrations and exhibitions since the 1970s.

"To learn ikebana, we would train-ride to New York City for a week in January,

repeating a week in July, to study with Grand Master Mutsuo Tomita.

"One cold, icy January evening, after dinner my friend Louise and I carefully walked to shop at B. Altman's. No available taxi.

"Altman's was showcasing "Chinese exports" as a special sale.

I spotted the jug! It was successfully shipped to my home.

"May you enjoy as I have! Always one of my favorites."
